In the Bay Area, out of 7 million people, 1.7 million immigrants from more than 70 countries are living.

Welcome

Welcome to the 6th annual "One Voice Ethnic Missions Conference"! Thankful and joyful hearts go to you. I especially thank Rev. JinSoo Lee, the senior pastor of New Vision Church for allowing One Voice to have the conference in the church. I also appreciate Rev. YoungBin Song, the mission pastor, and the members of the church and those of the mission department in particular for the help and love for ethnic missions.

The theme of this year's conference is "Refugees and the next generations." So many immigrants have come to us as refugees. The ministry work for the refugees and their children in the bay area are very important.

Firstly, Thomas Park of Refugee team of New Vision Church will present on the church's refugee ministry. We will find the situations and needs of refugee ethnic groups from his presentation. I hope that more churches can get united to serve the refugees and their children together following the conference.

Secondly, Star Kids ministry will be presented. Inspired and thankfully coached by Rev. Peter Jung of Homework Club of Guiding Light Church, One Voice was able to start to serve the ethnic children in Fremont last September through Homework Club and later Soccer Club started just months ago. Most of the children in the programs are from the families of Islamic and Hindi religion. In addition, Oakland Burmese Mission Baptist Church (OBMBC, Rev. Lone Wah Lazum) and First Mongolian Christian Church (Rev. Ogi Luvsan) are also getting ready to begin the Homework Club ministry as Star Kids ministry of One Voice in their neighborhood. Moreover, Star Kids ministry is expanding to Star Youths as pastor Bobby (Zolboo Altangerel) is organizing basketball fellowship with Mongol-Tibetan youths every Tuesday in Oakland, where more diverse ethnic refugees are residing than Fremont.

One Voice is now welcoming a new turn-

ing point after 6 years of reaching-out ethnic groups in the bay area. Most importantly, One Voice sets its mission focus on children and youths of unreached ethnic groups. It is because of this work that we finding families of ethnic groups opening and responding to the children teaching ministries who are taught and loved by the Christian volunteers.

In addition, One Voice is turning its financial support focus from "people" to "the mission works." One Voice has been supporting Rev. Abrahim Ferotan (a unique Afghani Pashtun pastor in the Bay Area) for 4 years (3 basic years plus 1 extended year) through March and he has been able to settle down in Hayward with family members. One Voice is still willing to support him as he initiates his own local Afghan missions in the bay area.

One Voice has received non-profit organization status (510 (c)(3)) and is allowed to have its own bank account to manage the offerings from late January this year. I appreciate JooSonGil Presbyterian Church and ItNet mission organization (Sam Lee, director and David Kim, CPA) for their sincere help in managing the One Voice finance.

One Voice has been able to continue its mission with the offerings from 21 churches and 52 individual donors during 2015 and till now. What is more grateful is that the pastors in the bay area have been praying for the revival of all nations in the bay area for 7 years every Tuesday at 1:00 pm in New Life Church, Fremont. Your sincere support and prayer along with the pastors' are the very source of power for One Voice to do His work of salvation here in the bay area.

The revival of ethnic groups in the bay area will be a spark of the global transformation of all nations! Welcome! It is great to have you all here today! Thank you very much for joining!

In 3. 8. 2014, New Vision refugee mission team was launched by 11 people who were moved in the heart by the refugee ministry in KGMC as a result of CCBA's UPG (Unreached People Group) training. From the start, our goal has been to reflect and share the heart and Spirit of Jesus through the conduct of our lives, more than with just our words. In the Refugee Team, there are currently seven staffs, eight trained ESL Tutors and 65 registered members.

The Refugee Aid organization RT and IRC members started volunteering every week and the services are as follows; ESL teachers, hospitals and social services agencies to provide refugees with goods and services such as resume writing, application for school enrollment aid, grocery shopping, recycled furniture, and more. By providing these goods and services filling the needs of refugees, we became friends with 14 refugee homes and 25 refugee children.

Our refugee ministry has also cooperated with the local church in unity with the sisters of the EM Disciple Church of Milpitas, and have been serving the refugees as ESL Tutors and mentors together. Furthermore when the children of the team members took after their parent's dedication of the refugees' situation, they made up a club called "REACH" in order to help refugees in their High School. There are 15 students who can give Tutor assistance to refugee children since the creation of REACH.

Holidays, such as Thanksgiving or Christmas Day is a good opportunity to share the loving hearts to refugees. Last Thanksgiving, we invited the Muslim refugees from Iraq and Somalia to the church to share dinner and to bless them and fellowship with them. In addition, during Christmas we visited the refugee families who had been living in cold apartments, to deliver Christmas gifts. Last year, we did a Backpack Drive for the refugee and

low income children. During that time, with the love of church members' offerings, we were able to make and distribute two hundred sets of backpacks and school supplies. We made similar donations to local pauper children, young Hmong refugees, and even refugee children in Turkey. We've decided to proceed with another backpack drive this coming fall for the new school year.



We also had fellowship time by taking picnic and hiking trip with refugee families. One of Muslim families who miss hiking was guided by our team to the prayer house in Santa Cruz and had a meal and hiked with us. After the hike, this refugee family wanted to come to worship in our church, some even came to open school classes, learned Knitting classes. When this family went a second time to the prayer house, we even did praise and prayer together, and gave them copies of the Bible. In addition, a deacon met the Afghan youth who were supposed to take driving test days ahead at the picnic events. They helped him with the actual driving practice and help to receive a driver's license and become a friend of the Afghan youth. Four of the Afghan refugee children enrolled during the summer holidays in the GLP Summer Academy and there were moments of joy for them to receive the love of Jesus.

Our New Vision refugee ministry team has a Bridge class right to know the culture and faith of Muslims for the ministry. And we're praying that we are able to establish ESL Center and start the IT related Project class with Silicon Valley for the regional characteristics in the future.

We wish to serve the refugees and ethnic home by working with all the churches in this area. Let's do this together!

Serving the Ethnic Children in Homework Club

n September 22nd, 2015, One Voice began its first own ministry with Homework Club to serve elementary school children in Fremont, where most Afghans (max 60,000) in the Bay Area are populated. Every Tuesday and Wednesday @ 4:00-6:00pm, the classroom of Centerville Community Center is filled with the beautiful faces of the children from the diverse language groups of people from far, such as Arabic, Persian as well as Bengali, Guajarati, Hindi, Marwari, Oriya, Tamil, and Telugu language groups of Muslims and Hindis. At present, more than 30 children are regularly attending.

In the beginning we only had 10 or so children from the carnival event after promotion in the neighborhood. However, the members have grown where we now need a waiting list. It is getting harder and harder for the volunteers to effectively concentrate on the children and their homework. We need more volunteers now than ever. Despite our situation, thankfully the following churches are sending volunteers — New Life Church, Emmanuel Korean Presbyterian Church, New Vision Church, Joyful Church, Serving Church, Venture Church's Korean Group, and Spectrum Church. We appreciate the churches service

with grateful hearts.

We put bible verse stickers in the children's personal attendance log book so that they memorize them for prize as we finish the semester. We bless the children in prayer for snacks, too. Also, two children who had difficulties in reading are privately tutored in their homes and in the classroom. The Parents of the children appreciate the volunteers very much. In particular, we found a mother of an Arabic child needing English tutoring as they just came to America about 2 years ago. A volunteer started to help the mother in English grammar and vocabulary. Later, the mother's sister joined the study meeting and the fellowship is getting more intimate.

Teaching the Ethnic Children through Sports in Soccer Club

od gave us an idea of children's soccer team in addition to Homework Club. On March 5th 2016, One Voice started Soccer Club with free uniforms and soccer shoes for 30 children who registered out of Homework Club. Now, 13 coaches are involved in the Soccer Club every Saturday at 10:00-11:45 AM in the green field of Centerville Community Center. After soccer practice and games, children have "coach time" for 15 minutes



before lunch. During coach time, pastors are invited to teach the children of sportsmanship in the context of the teachings in the Bible. Interestingly, 3 new coaches who are fathers of the children joined the Soccer Club in April.

The Meaning and Vision of Star Kids

one Voice is now administering the two clubs in the name of "Star Kids" which was inspired from Daniel 12:3(Those who lead many to righteousness will shine like the stars forever). The name "Star Kids" is our vision. We have a dream that the little children will one day become great leaders shining in the darkness of the world. Even though they come here as minorities and as refugees, they will be very important leaders in America to lead their own countries and nations to the Lord who is Righteous.

Star Kids programs are gateways connect-

ing the churches to the ethnic immigrant families of the children. A Muslim family invited my family and two other volunteers to their home for dinner. It was an appreciation of the help of volunteers for their son. I also invited the family to my home to share happy and friendly fellowship.

The Extension of Star Kids in Oakland

ar Kids is planning to extend its boundary to Oakland as Oakland Burmese Mission Baptist Church (Rev. Lone Wah Lazum) and First Mongolian Christian Church in Oakland (Rev. Ogi Luvsan) are seeking to reach out to children in their ethnically sensitive environments. Oakland city has very diverse ethnic groups coming from Tibet, Bhutan, Burma, Mongo, Cambodia, and Vietnam. After a promotional event in the summer, they plan to start Homework Clubs in the fall. One Voice expects the churches in Oakland, Berkeley, and Richmond can be united to serve the ethnic children together. Rev. Zolboo Altangerel ("Bobby") has been seeking to set up a platform of Tibetan mission in Oakland and Rich-

mond. Now, he is running Tibetan-Mongolian youths basketball fellowship every Tuesday. His basketball fellowship for youths gives One Voice a vision of "Star Youths" through sports.

Since our last conference, the Lord has been guiding us to see the urgent needs of ethnic children's ministry in the Bay Area. One Voice hopes to serve the ethnic children in the different cities of the Bay Area. One Voice is planning to provide "Coding Club" that will teach programming language for children and

> also start "Children's Choir" in the near future. It is great and awesome even just to imagine the different ethnic children singing with one voice to praise God.

Let us get together!

M any refugees are losing their lives as they striving to come to a new land for them. The picture of a dead refugee child Alyan Kurdi who lied in a Turkey beach

was terrible as it calling us to help the refugees and their children. In San Francisco, 44.2% (342,000) and in San Jose, 55.5% (489,000) of population 5 years old and over are speaking a non-English language at home (American Community Survey 2009, U.S. Census Bureau). The Bay Area is our first critical mission field! Being here itself is an urgent call from the Lord for us to be missionaries here. The children we meet in Star Kids will be great leaders who will lead many people to the Lord. The revival of ethnic groups in the Bay Area will be the revival of all nations in the whole world. Let us get together in One Voice! Thank you so much for your prayer and support!

Tibetan Mission



I thas been over one year since I started my ministry for Tibetan people in the Bay Area. During this time, I have witnessed how much God loves Tibetan people, the richness of their culture and their hospitality.

By the grace of God, we had a chance to start a basketball club among Tibetan young adults and this was a great opportunity for us to build a relationship with them. The basketball

club operates weekly every Tuesday or Thursday and we have at least eight Tibetans coming weekly. These young men are the members of the basketball team, representing the North Californian Tibetans. They are very happy and satisfied with One Voice's support and wanted me to convey their gratitude.

In addition, I had the pleasure to meet with other Tibetan missionaries and people who are serving them in Riverside, CA where the TPRN(Tibetan People Resource Network) conference was held. It was great to witness the first translation of the New Testament into modern Tibetan language.

Weekly I meet my Tibetans friends and talk about God, while eating lunch and dinner. So far, they enjoy hearing about my testimonies and we engage in very passionate discussions about the Bible and God. My goal is to start a weekly bible study group with them. Please pray for the Tibetan people and the missionaries who are serving these people.

reeting in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. I want to thank all of you for your prayers and support for the Hmong refugee ministry. Since the mission and ministry for Hmong refugees were introduced for the first time at One Voice last year, numerous churches have been interested in helping and joining in the work of God. I will briefly report what our ministry has done for the

past years. On Passion Week in March, our teenagers were invited to New Vision Church and traveled to San Francisco and Monterey for 4 days. They also had faith training at the church

and performed a special song at a sunrise service. On Easter, our teenager praise team sang Gospel songs at Fresno Korean church corporate service and gave glory to God. It was the first time when the praise team performed in front of other Fresno churches and many Koreans in Fresno began to learn





about the Hmong refugee ministry and pray for them. Last summer, we invited approxi-

mately 740 children and teenagers to our church for VBS. 11 churches joined and volunteered at VBS and a Hmong television broadcasting station advertised our VBS event for one month. After the completion of VBS, 15 volunteers had a retreat at Yosemite National Park. For Thanksgiving, 45 parents of our Hmong teenagers were invited at our church for a dinner. We went on a vision trip to Los Angeles every December, Thanks to invitations from 3 Korean churches and support, we could visit Koreatown and an amusement park. 28 teenagers from Fresno stayed in houses of Korean Christians for 3 days and were inspired by the Christian households. In the daytime, the teenagers learned about the Word of God from missionaries and participated in Christmas events at churches. 7 churches from Northern and Southern California helped and participated in a Christmas event last year. Especially, New Vision Church prepared gifts and lunch for everyone. 9 different teams-fan dance, Korean traditional percussion quartet, Taekwondo, praise team, pantomime, and opera-came to Fresno and performed at the event. 750 people, including volunteers, gathered at a gym where the event was held and celebrated the birth of Jesus Christ. Currently, our church is preaching the Word of God to new teenagers in Fresno through individual Bible lessons and Korean language school. We strive to bring those who are interested in Korea and Korean culture to the church and to teach them about Christianity and the love of God. Our Hmong, Cambodian, Laos, Caucasian, and Mexican students attend a service every Sunday as well as a Korean language class. On May 7, 2016, 30 students will go to LA Korean Music

Festival. We will not only take our students, who love K-Pop, to the festival to enjoy, but also have them attend a sunrise service at LA Saranag Church in the morning. They will have special Bible study sessions at the church before going to the concert at night. Korean culture is used as a tool for preaching Christianity. Every week, the mission teams from numerous churches collaborate with each other to spread the Word of God to the area of Fresno. Because of their dedication and prayers, more and more people in Fresno have believed in God and His Word. Thank you again for your unfailing support and prayers.
