

Welcome to One Voice Ethnic Missions Conference 2015



Welcome, everybody, to One Voice Ethnic Missions Conference 2015. From the bottom of my heart, I want to thank all of you for your sincere hearts for

the Lord, and I thank the Lord for His unending work of salvation among all nations! Today, we will be presenting four important areas of ethnic missions in the Bay Area, for the purpose of networking and partnering together.

First, we will hear from the Afghan ethnic mission in Fremont. Two video reports will be shown. One will be from Missionary Tim Fortescue of Global Gates, and the other by Rev. Abrahim Ferotan who has been financially supported by all of you through One Voice for three years. The presentation will be followed by the married couple called "Omed" (nickname) of YWAM. They came from lowa a year ago to serve the Afghan mission here in Fremont. They are one of those who have recently been moving from other states to Fremont to serve the Afahan ethnic group in the Bay Area. Very interestingly, last year in particular, we saw two young missionary couples also move from other states to the Silicon Valley. I can tell a significant difference between the last 10 years and now in Afghan mission here. I believe that God is moving more and more gospel workers to this Bay Area for His planned season of harvest. Every other Thursday, people in the Afghan mission in the Bay Area gather to pray and share their ideas and thoughts for mission work together.

Second, Rev. "Bobby" Zolboo Altangerel of the First Mongolian Church of Oakland will tell us his call to the Tibetan ethnic group in Richmond and nearby area.

Rev. Bobby replaced Rev. Gelenkhuu Tsolmonbaatar who served the Tibetan mission for about 10 months until December 2014. Rev. Bobby had finished Contextualized Leadership Development (CLD) of Golden Gate Theological Seminary and dedicated himself to be God's full-time servant with ordination for Tibetan mission in the Bay Area. From April, Rev. Bobby and his wife Enkhzul Ganbold alona with Rev. Ogi Luvsan and his wife are learning the Tibetan language from a Tibetan monk instructor from the Tibetan Association in Northern California (TANC).

Thirdly, Rev. Abe Hwang from Fresno will open our eyes with his presentation on the missionary work among the 60,000 Hmong in this area. For the past 17 years, he has served the Hmong people in Fresno, first as a church missionary and now while pastoring Harmony Korean church, planted in 2007. He is currently reaching out to the Hmong children and youth every Saturday with the help of churches from LA and the Bay Area. New Vision Church in Milpitas is already involved in the reaching-out in Fresno. Emmanuel Korean Presbyterian Church in San Jose is also first planning a shortterm mission in the Hmong community this summer. The Hmong people were forced to leave their land as refugees after the fall of Vietnam to communists in 1975, because they fought for American troops in the country. Fresno has the largest community of Hmong in America (91,244 according to Census 2010). In this regard, Fresno, just 3 hours away from the Bay Area by car, is our critical mission field.

Finally, Rev. Peter Jung of Guiding Light Project (GLP) will share his unique ministry to the under-served children of ethnic groups in the south San Jose area.

GLP runs an afterschool program called "Homework Club" every Tuesday and Thursday. Held in a community center, it helps elementary children complete school assignments. Additionally, GLP provides an arts and craft class every Saturday morning. They also gather for family worship every Thursday evening with dinner together.

I found that GLP's focus on the children of Homework Club is an effective way to penetrate the children's entire family and reach the ethnic groups with the gospel message. GLP is providing us a critical turn of perspectives on ethnic missions by raising the importance and effectiveness of young generations of ethnic groups. The 1st generation of ethnic groups are usually defensive against other cultures and religions different from their own. However, the parents become open and even friendly to these different groups of people as their kids are helped - particularly in the area of academics. Out of this discovery, another Homework Club will be launched in Fremont on September 1st of this year. This will be for the Afghan elementary students, and will be held in the Centerville Community Center which is in the heart of the Afghan residence. We need both youth and adult volunteers Tuesdays and Wednesdays for Homework Club. Please, give us your hands of love and passion.

Since its first event in 2011, One Voice has been able to support Rev. Abrahim for Afghans and Rev. Bobby for Tibetans in the Bay Area with faithful prayers and precious offerings from 21 churches and organizations and 79 individuals (43 only in 2014). Thank you so much for your generous actions and offerings and for having a passion for missions. One Voice is also greatly indebted to the praying pastors of the Tuesday prayer meeting group who, rain or shine, gather at New Life Church in Fremont every Tuesday @ 1pm to pray together. It is now multi-ethnic prayer meeting with Rev. Abrahim and Rev. Ogi.





What & Why is "One Voice"?

1. What is One Voice? It's a united churchplanting movement for ethnic people groups in America

One Voice identifies America as Korean immigrant churches' primary mission field. Immigrants from all around the world come to America and provides an easy avenue for churches to reach out to the ethnic people groups, as they come to live next door to us. Since 2011, when One Voice first began its ethnic ministry, One Voice has been strategically organizing Korean churches' missions work for outreach and church-planting, directing attention to the ethnic groups in the Bay Area. One Voice had its first ethnic missions conference for networking and partnering of churches with ethnic ministries in the Bay Area. So far, 21 sponsoring churches and organizations, along with 79 individual Christians have become connected and are financially supporting two ethnic ministers, enabling them to keep working for church-planting; one is an Afghan ministry by Rev. Abrahim Ferotan and the other is a Tibetan ministry by Rev. "Bobby" Zolboo Altangerel.



2. Biblical findings for One Voice's ethnic missions and its vision

1) "Ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8) as an ethnic concept (Matthew 28:19-20) rather than geographical: "The ends of the earth" spoken of in Acts 1:8 ("But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria. and to the ends of the earth.") does not only imply a geographical concept, but also ethnic concept. This becomes much clearer as we look at Matthew 28:19-20 ("Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the

Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.") The only main verb in the verse is to "make disciples" (mathetusate) and that verb's main object "all the nations" (panta ta ethne"). It is interesting to find that even "go" is a participle as is "baptizing" and "teaching" in the same verse. Therefore, the verses both in Acts and Mathew focus on "make disciples" rather than just "go"; on "ethne" rather than geographical regions. In this sense, we now understand that the charge of the Lord to go to Jerusalem and Judea refers to go to the Jews, to go to Samaria refers to those who were the half Jewish, and thus those who are of mixed ethnic marriages, and to the ends of the earth refers to those who are non-Jews, that is Gentiles. When we look around in the Bay Area with that perspective of "ethne," we can quickly find that America is the center of all the different ethnic groups from the ends of the earth. This is why the Bay Area is the primary mission field of Korean immigrant churches already living in the same area.

2) Immigrant churches' dual mission (Isaiah 49:6): Korean immigrant churches have the dual mission that the prophet Isaiah spoke of: "Indeed He says, 'It is too small a thing that You should be My Servant To raise up the tribes of Jacob, And to restore the preserved ones of Israel; I will also give You as a light to the Gentiles, That You should be My salvation to the ends of the earth." To call the Korean people to return to the Lord is "too small a thing". It is, of course, something that must be done. However, at the same time, the reason God planted over 300 Korean churches in the Bay Area also has a areater mission – for the fulfillment of God's plan of salvation of all the nations (ethne). The One Voice conference is one avenue to meet this awesome challenge from the Lord.

3) Vision for world mission from the Bay Area: One Voice realizes that reaching out to the ethnic groups in the Bay Area will make a stronger world missions effort.

When unreached ethnic individuals in the bay area come to know Jesus, they can then take the gospel to their own groups. But when these individuals preach the gospel to their own groups, they will be able to speak the same language, religion, and culture. The saved ethnic Christians are the best missionaries to their own people. America is full of these missionaries to-be.

3. Characteristics of the bay area in America as a mission field

1) 1,265 ethnic groups in America: Recently, IMB (International Mission Board; www.peoplegroups.org) reported 1,265 ethnic groups in the States -much more than the 481 reported 5 years ago. Among these ethnic groups, 343 ethnic groups are "unreached", that is, less than 2% are Christians. 191 of these ethnic groups are not even engaged in America - that is, they are an unreached people group which has no active church planting underway. In terms of language, there are 327 language groups in America. California alone has 215 language groups (www.peoplegroups.org; U.S. Census Bureau, 2006-2008 American Community Survey). Also, even in a Census as far back as in 2000 show that more than 70 nationalities representing 1.7 million immigrants living in the Bay Area.

2) Half of Bay Area's population is bilingual: there is a very exciting fact with respect to languages. In California, of the population that is 5 years old or older, 43.1%, or 14,751,000 people speak a language other than English. That breaks down to 44.2% or 342,000 people in San Francisco and 55.5% or 489,000 people in San Jose who are bilingual. (American Community Survey 2009, U.S. Census Bureau). This means that half of the Bay Area are potential missionaries that God can use to go into the other nations to spread the gospel in their languages.





3) Surge in the Asian population: According to the results of the Census for the past ten years, the total US population went increased by 9.7%, whereas the Asian population increased by 43.3%. Among the Asian population, the Indian population increased by 69.4%, the greatest population increase. In California's case, the Asian population saw the largest increase (from 2000 to 2010, increased by 31.5%).

4) Silicon Valley as a gate to global revival: The rapid rise of the Information Technology (IT) industry in Silicon Valley has been drawing professional workers from all over the world. As Silicon Valley receives the global spotlight, the change of Silicon Valley by the gospel will impact the world rapidly. As the power of the gospel changes us here, we are in the very gate of a global turn-over by the power of the gospel.

Doors wide open to next generations of ethnic groups:

1) Defensiveness of 1st generation immigrants against new religion and new cultures in America: There is a saying that Moslems become more Moslem in America. This is true of other religious immigrant groups as well. They try not to lose their reliaious and cultural identity in the beginning stage of settling down in the States. However, most importantly, they want their children to do well in American education system. Education and academic help opens the door wide to gospel into the unreached ethnic groups because parents generally do not mind of academic helpers' religions as long as their children are being served and helped academically.



Kids Club – A strategic example of reaching out to the 2nd generation:

Years ago, I served with church youth in the Kids Club at Milpitas Elementary School, as a volunteer sports coach. Every Wednesday for 3 hours, about 20 volunteers from several nearby churches aathered to teach them the Bible by first helping the kids with their homework. These children were Sikh, Buddhist, and Hindu families, as well as from families with no religion. The parents were so thankful for the Kid's Club's provision of after school activities for their children while they were working. Kids Club served as a form of a baby sitter for the parents so they could make more money at work. At the end of each semester, the children of the Kid's Club made a group presentation by singing praise songs such as "Jesus loves me, this I know." Very interestingly, the parents followed along, happily clapping their hands. Kids Club was their ESL (Enalish as Second Language) course for the semester. And, the words of the Bible had been planted into the hearts of the

little children for an entire semester. The organizing pastor said to me "I hope that I can have more volunteers from Korean churches in the same town." Recently, I was thrilled to meet Rev. Peter Jung of Guiding Light Project (GLP). He is serving the children of the underserved communities in south San Jose and planted a church with the children and their parents. He runs Homework Club for two days to help the kids with their homework, along with a Saturday Crafts Class, a Summer Academic camp, and weekly Thursday worship. As I visit his ministry, I find that many more people are undergoing hardship than I had imagined.

Seeing all this, One Voice realizes that there is a great need to help elementary children academically. Therefore, with the help of GLP, it will create a Homework Club for the Afghan and Tibetan community. One Voice is meeting with the Afghan Coalition and Tibetan Association of Nor Cal to discuss the education programs for the children of the two communities.

For the Afghan community, Centerville Community Center in Fremont is reserved for Homework Club starting September 1st, two days a week. The Afghan Coalition even promised me that they will promote the Homework Club for their children. Please, pray for a revival of the children that will spark a revival of the parents and into the whole ethnic people groups in the Bay Area and beyond.

1. Afghan mission Report







- 1. Afghan mission Report in the Bay Area
 - 1 Rev. Abrahim Ferotan by Video

Rev. Abrahim was born as a Pashtun. He actively served Afghans in New Deli, India for ten years by planting and raising churches in the area. One Voice has been supporting him since 2012. He is currently living in Hayward and is waiting for his family's immigration visas to arrive, so that they can come to the States from Canada. He is praying for these visas to arrive soon so that his wife can join him in his ministry as soon as possible. As a Christian pastor, he faces many difficulties from Moslems in Fremont. Nevertheless, he was able to start his first worship service with around five Afghans on April 14, 2014. However, the worship service is no longer held. Recently, God sent a missionary couple from lowa to him to learn the Afghan language and culture from him.

Rev. Abrahim is currently working with missionary Tim Fortescue of Global Gates Networks to reach out to the Afghan community. Rev. Abrahim is a unique, native Afghani Christian pastor in this Afghan-heavy Bay Area. We need to support his ministry in Fremont since his role is very essential for Afghan missions in the Bay Area. Please pray for his family to join him as soon as possible and to have a worshipping congregation in their own language very soon in Fremont.

② YWAM Bay Area: Omed (nick name for confidentiality)

We began praying for Afghanistan in 2009. We took a class called Perspectives and it changed the way we think about our purpose in theworld and gave us a passion to share the Good News with Muslims. We started to follow the Afghan War and started to learn names of the Taliban, learning the people groups in Afghanistan, and started to pray for them to know Isa al Masih (Jesus the Messiah). Bryant also had a dream where God showed him that in our life "more people from Pakistan and Afghanistan, including Taliban members, will be worshiping Jesus than anyone could count." That dream helped confirm that we would dedicate our lives to serving Afghans and Pashtuns (a people group in Afghanistan and Pakistan). Lilli also had a vision from God while praying with a friend telling us to move to California, and not Afghanistan, to work among Afghans. That vision brought us to California in January 2014.

We work with YWAM Bay Area and also with a team in Fremont made up of believers from various churches and organizations. Omed means "hope" in Dari and Pashto, the two languages major languages in Afghanistan. God has given us a vision to see Afghans filled with hope for every aspect of their lives! Our mission statement is: Engaging the Afghan community to see a discipleship making movement that reaches the nations with the love of Isa by:

- Studying the Bible in heart languages and making disciples of the lost
- Praying and seeking justice for the oppressed
- · Working towards community transformation by partnering with Afghan organizations
- Living and working in an Afghan context
- Providing opportunities and education for others to engage in outreach to Muslims

We are not looking to start "churches" or take people out of their culture! We believe that God is doing a new thing here: that Afghans will fall in love with Jesus and will disciple others into the Kingdom. Many of our friends have experienced the love and peace of Jesus through reading the Bible in their heart language, seeing God heal them through our prayers miraculously, and by simple acts of kindness. We often share meals with friends, help them learn English or teach them to drive, and just be friends to the lonely.

Since moving here, we have deeply involved ourselves with the Afghan community. We live, work, and enjoy life with Afghans! For one year, we lived with an Afghan family to learn the culture, language, and to meet their extended family. God taught us so much during that year! We now live in the "Little Kabul" area surrounded by Afghan families. Lilli volunteers teaching English and health classes, and is currently starting a new support group for women victims of domestic violence with several Afghan leaders. We are praying for God to heal these women through this group! Lilli also works as a nurse in a community hospital with many Afghan patients.

Bryant is a personal trainer and has a passion to use fitness as a way to disciple men. He is working and praying towards starting a gym in Little Kabul, called Qawe Barbell. Qawe means strength of body and character in Dari and Pashto. The vision is to build men of strong character and body to be leaders in the Afghan community! It will be a place for men to gather and spend time together. The gym will also give 1 year paid internships to Afghan men in order to help teach them job skills and give them work experience when they arrive in the US. During their year internship they will be encouraged and discipled by Christian men in order so that they can pour into the community around them.

3 Tim Fortescue of Global Gates Network



In 2004 our current Global Gates representative had the privilege of engaging the Afghan community in the San Francisco Bay Area with the good news of Christ's love. Over the past eleven years the love for this people group has grown and the Afghan community has proven a training ground for learning disciple making and community engagement principles to mobilize others to reach out to other Muslim and least reached people groups throughout California with the gospel. Afghans experiencing

Christ's love is not only affecting immigrants in the United States but the country of Afghanistan is being impacted as well.

All my life, I never wanted to be a minister. I always thought that I would be a regular member of a church, who would have a simple and peaceful life with wife and kids. However, God had a different plan for me and the plans I developed for myself failed.

When I was young, I was scared to be a worship leader, but somehow God transformed me into one. Then I told myself I would never be a minister. And again, God changed that, too. Because I know what God did for me, I could never resist his request and command. I have to obey them out of love and fear. I want to share the gospel with the Tibetan nation.

Now God is calling me to be a minister to the Tibetans. First, I thought this was a crazy idea but slowly, God changed my heart and showed me that these people need God's love and mercy. I understand how this nation is suffering under Satan's rule, and I want to help them by being God's tool. I know it is God's will and it is our duty to evangelize to all people.

Tibetans and Mongolians have a very similar culture: we are similar in facial features, our food, we have similar names, and so on. Tibetans seem very open to Mongolians as opposed to other ethnic groups. I can use this advantage to get close to them and become friends.

For my strategy, I am aiming for the younger Tibetan generation. Because they are young, they would be more open to different things. Besides, they are the future of the Tibetan nation. In order to reach out to them, I would like to do the following:

- 1. Most importantly, pray.
- Teach or tutor math, science, English, college preparation, computer hardware and software. I have a Ph.D Software Engineer who can teach some software classes and I can teach math and science.
- Outreach events. From my research, I found out that Tibetan youths like to play basketball. We can host basketball tournaments or just hang out with them at a park with basketball courts.
- 4. Legal/financial help. Help them with legal issues such as immigration. Help them with financial aid and scholarships. I have experienced people who can help me with that.

My goal: To find and prepare one devoted Christian leader who will serve the Tibetans. Help them start their cell/Bible study group and eventually a church.

3. Hmong Mission Report



Rev. Abe Hwang, Harmony Church in Fresno, CA

Harmony church was planted in 2007 in Fresno by a group of Korean Christians, including Korean international students. We are concentrating on Hmong mission in the Asian refugee-packed area. Saturday outreach is going on with the help of churches from LA and the Bay Area. Maximum attendance has reached 300 Hmong children in the Saturday outreach program. Harmony church has just about 15 Korean members now but there are over 70 students

of other Asian ethnicities in our Sunday school. Overall, the Fresno area has an Asian population of 100,000. Of that number, 60,000 are Hmong refugees. There are also 30,000 refugees from Laos, Cambodia, Vietnam, Myanmar, and Thailand.

After Vietnam fell to communists in 1975, the Hmong people were expelled from their land because they had helped American troops in the war. America accepted them as refugees and let them to stay in Fresno. Most of the Hmong people were farmers in the jungle, without good education. Many of them still live with deep superstitions and old conventions that do not mix well in modern society. However, about 10% of the Hmong people in the area become important and influential people in the main arena of society, living with pride. Still, most of the refugees have low incomes and have many difficulties in life. I believe that Jesus Christ is the only answer and hope for their and their children's lives.





Hmong people never had a country for them to go back to. Interestingly, they like Korea and the Korean culture and are wide open to learning the Korean language. Presently, most of the students of the Korean language school are Hmong youths and children.

Most of the parents of the Hmong youth are farmers. I go out to visit these parents at their farms, telling them the gospel and also just becoming friends with them. As I come to understand their culture, partake in meals with them, and become close friends with them, they start to

allow their children to come to church. And eventually, the parents also start to come to worship services. In general, there are about 10 or so children per Hmong family. The bilingual Hmong 2nd generation is essential to reach out to their non-English speaking parents. They are translators as well as gospel sharers for their parents.

Vision of Harmony Church

- We want to reach to the 90,000 Asian refugees including the 60,000 Hmong people among them. Therefore we are praying for 10% of the 90,000 people to get saved in 10 years.
- South Fresno has many cheap rental facilities. We want to run a cultural community center for worship and Bible studies for discipleship training as well as for afterschool programs for children and even job-training, such as teaching computer skills.
- We will make Hmong youths in the church Bible teachers for Sunday schools now and missionaries in the near future for their own community. They are the only route to reach out to the old Hmong people.
- We want to strengthen the Saturday outreach mission and extend its boundaries further with partnership from more churches in the Bay Area.
- Instead of self-support, I hope to be able to make a full commitment to the Hmong mission in Fresno.
- I want to connect Hmong kids to sincere Korean Christian families. By using vacations, etc. I hope to send Hmong children to visit and stay in Korean Christian homes so these children may learn how to live as sound Christians. Most Hmong kids are growing up under unmarried single mothers or in divorced families.
- We need more transportation for about 150 Hmong youths and children to come to church and go back home on Sundays and Saturdays. It is very hard for Hmong children to get a ride for the church activities.




